A much sought after teacher and performer, viewed by many to be the most influential hammered dulcimer player in the US, Ken Kolodner is well known for his improvisational and expressive style, was described as "outstanding" by *The New York Times*. Ken's initial interest in traditional American fiddle grew to include hammered dulcimer and hammered mbira while it developed into an ever-expanding musical appetite beginning with Celtic music and eventually into music spanning many cultures ranging from South American music to Chinese music. Focusing largely on traditional music, this award-winning musician and teacher is a regular fixture at many music camps and festivals, has appeared on numerous NPR radio shows and an Emmy-nominated CBS TV special and has a new book/CD on Appalachian fiddling (*Mel Bay*). The latest recordings are a recording of Old-Time music with his son Brad Kolodner (claw-hammer banjo and guitar) and another of Celtic, Quebecois and Old-Time music with fiddler Elke Baker.
